A viewpoint seen from a very high elevation. May also been known as "a bird's eye view".

An island located west of the Isle of Mull in the Inner Hebrides of Scotland. Coll is known for its sandy beaches, which rise to form large sand dunes, for its corncrakes, and for Breacachadh Castle.

Maps often use symbols to represent things

A map key shows what the symbols mean.

Natural features of the world's surface such as beach, cliff, coast, sea, ocean, soil, vegetation.

Relates only to the human environment; something that is built by humans and would not have existed in nature without humans. These may include a city, town, village, house, farm, port, harbour, shop.

A major road that has been specially built for fast travel over long distances. Motorways have several lanes and special places where traffic gets on and leaves.

A place where you can buy goods or services.

A building where someone lives.

A building or set of buildings where large amounts of goods are made using machines.

Bodies of water that flow. Rivers start where rain falls onto hills and mountains and flows downhill to join the sea or a lake or loch. Rivers can be wide or narrow, fast or slow, can travel a long or short way. Rivers contain fresh water.

The salty water that covers a large part of the surface of the earth.

A piece of land that rises higher than everything surrounding it. The United Kingdom defines hills as summits less than 1,000 feet.

An extensive area of sand or shingle sloping down to a sea or lake.
