Topic

Maths & English

The children have now sat their fourth SATs paper in test conditions. Using these results we can begin to see how children will most likely do. Above all, they identify gaps that we can work on in the coming months. Test results have informed the content of coming lessons, as well as group or individual interventions.

For your information, each paper has its own grading (so, for example there is a grade for the arithmetic paper) and then there is an overall combined percentage and the final grading (arithmetic, reasoning 1 and reasoning 2).

As the term progresses we will regularly revise key concepts so that they become as fluent as possible in the application of their knowledge.

We will also have a final 'mock' where we use both the year 6 and year 5 classrooms to prepare the children for the way we 'take over' the bottom of the school during the real thing.

Homework

Homework continues to be set on a Thursday and needs to be handed in on a Tuesday. Spelling tests will take place on a Thursday.

As we prepare for May, we will send home SATstype papers for the children to work through. As reading is a national priority - being a key skill for the future - each week children will be asked to complete a section of a reading paper. Alongside the reading paper will be one of the other key areas, such as an arithmetic paper or a SPAG paper.

Please remind your child that they can work through the paper as an activity, not a timed test. They can seek advice from an adult if they are stuck and can use the answers to check their progress.
